# Notes and Selected Resources: Portage County and the Civil War

#### General

Portage County had a population of 24,208 in the 1860 census, with aproximately 5000 of them being military age males. Approximately 2000 men went to war from the county, and over 300 died. (The 1885 <u>History of Portage County</u> gives the number that served as over 2000 and lists township totals adding up to 2070, while an 1874 atlas gives it as 1839.) According to the 1885 history, the numbers of soldiers supplied by the various townships were as follows: Atwater, 107; Aurora, 82; Brimfield, 88; Charlestown, 59; Deerfield, 113; Edinburg, 46; Franklin, 159; Freedom, 55; Hiram, 120; Mantua, 85; Nelson, 118; Palmyra, 38; Paris, 79; Randolph, 210; Ravenna, 235; Rootstown, 61; Shalersville, 72; Streetsboro, 96; Suffield, 132; Windham, 115.

Served April, 1861 - July, 1864. Companies F (Franklin Mills Rifles) and G (Tyler Guards) from Portage County. Fought in Western Virginia, Shenandoah Valley, Northern Virginia/ Maryland/Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Georgia. Armed with Springfields.

# **171st Ohio Volunteer Infantry**

"100 days men". Served from May 7 - August 20, 1864. Parts of Companies F and I from 14th

Battalion, Ohio National Guard, Portage County. Performed guard duty at Johnson's Island, Ohio Prison Camp and fought against Morgan's cavalry at Keller's Bridge, Kentucky..

# Cotter's Independent Battery and 1st Ohio Volunteer Light Artillery, Battery A (Ravenna Light Artillery)

Cotter's Independent Battery mustered in for three months on July 2, 1861, mustered out on September 3, 1861. Fought in Western Virginia. John Haven of Shalersville was the first man from Portage County to die from combat in the war, having been mortally wounded at Scary Creek, Virgina.

The men from the battery who re-enlisted plus additional recruits were mustered in to the 1st OVLA, battery A for three years on September 6, 1861 and fought in Kentucky, Tennessee, Georgia and Louisiana. The unit was mustered out on July 31, 1865.

Served form Summer, 1862 - August, 1865. Fought in the Shenandoah Valley, Northern Virginia, Maryland and Pennsylvania. Armed with Burnside carbines and Remington Army revolvers.
